Our history



St. Luke's, 1923

Ada was established in July of 1891, and early in its settlement, several Episcopal families moved into the area. The roots of St. Luke's are in the organization of a guild for Episcopal women who began meeting in their homes about 1910.


In 1939 the cornerstone was laid for the present church building. The church proper, and other later additions were built of native limestone guarried near Ada. The architectural design is reputed to have been modeled after designs attributed to Sir Christopher Wren. As St. Luke's grew and expanded. additional space was needed. The first parish hall connected to the church, a surplus WWII Army Air Corps barracks, was purchased and moved from East Central University by one of the founding families, and renovated in 1949.

In 1951 a new rectory was built to the east of the parish hall. In 1961 the Christian Education building (Blake Hall) was added to the facilities. In 1981, the original parish hall was demolished and the present parish hall, which included a basement, kitchen, nursery, new offices, choir room, and vesting sacristy was built, and the original vesting sacristy in the church was converted into the columbarium. In 1991, the rectory was converted into the church offices, a parking lot to the east of the new offices was paved, and in 1992 the previous office in the parish hall was remodeled into a larger vesting sacristy.

Today, St. Luke's is generally recognized as a jewel of church architecture, certainly one of the most aesthetically pleasing churches in the diocese, and indeed, in the entire region. Our church setting is one of worshipful serenity, inside and out.

Our community

You might recognize our water tower from country music star Blake Shelton's album, Bringing Back Sunshine, but Ada is much more than the home of numerous famous musicians and artists. It is a little town with a BIG spirit - one that is dedicated to its local public schools and university as well as its infrastructure and social services.

Ada has an estimated population of 17,000, and is the county seat of Pontotoc County, Oklahoma, which has an estimated population of 38,000. Ada is within easy driving distance of three major cities. It is located 83 miles southeast of Oklahoma City, 120 miles southwest of Tulsa, and 160 miles north of Dallas/Ft. Worth. The city was established in 1891, is a quality oriented city located in the rolling hills of southern Oklahoma, and has been described as a place where the West meets the South. It is large enough to offer many bigger city amenities, such as a four-year university (East Central University) and a thriving business climate, yet still small enough to provide a safe and fun place to raise a family.

Ada boasts four school districts - Ada, Byng, Latta, and Vanoss - each a distinct size to meet any family's needs. It also has three major hospitals and six public parks, including two public aquatic centers. There are numerous local and national retail and dining offerings as well as two movie theaters and two performing art theaters as well.

St. Luke's Church collaborates with Asbury United Methodist Church in an ecumenical food distribution program for the community. Volunteers from several churches are involved in the labor intensive process of packing and distributing food to qualifying families twice a month. Recipients are allowed to receive food from any one of the three. Funding for the Food Pantry is generated through donations from churches, civic groups, and individuals as well as food drives sponsored by various groups in the community. The Regional Food Bank provides food either free or at very low cost. Wal-Mart donates their surplus produce and meat as a supplement.

Emergency Food Pantry

St. Luke's Church office provides an emergency food pantry that is open to the public. The pantry is stocked mainly through donations from church members. In 2023, the pantry fed an average of 15 families per month. This May alone, 28 households (totaling 99 people) were fed. Each family's box of groceries consists of at least three full dinners, snack options, and items for breakfast, and is personalized based on each family or individual's needs.

Tabitha's Orphanage -Haiti

Following the hurricane that devastated Haiti, several parishioners went there to render such assistance as they could. While there, they found an orphanage located in Cap-Haitien which was in need of assistance. On their return, a special collection was made for the orphanage's benefit, and since then the Easter Offering has often been designated for Tabitha's Orphanage. These funds are used to supply the orphanage with basic necessities as well as school uniforms and supplies. Tabitha's Orphanage provides full care for children to attend school, church, and to live on campus.

Meals on Wheels operates in virtually every community in America through partnership with local programs like that of Mercy Hospital. The program depends on volunteer drivers like our dedicated delivery drivers from St. Luke's.

Youth Group

St. Luke's Youth Group is the heart of our children's ministry. Our Wednesday night evenings invite youth from grades 6th-12th to gather for fun, fellowship, and FOOD! Our Youth Group numbers have grown significantly since 2020. With these growing numbers, funds were allocated to redecorate the outdated space with new paint, furniture, and electronics.

Our Youth Group also participates in service projects, such as ringing the bell for the Salvation Army and volunteering at the local soup kitchen. In addition, for fun, field trips to the zoo, arcade, and movie theater, as well as an annual pool party, are planned each year.

Trunk or Treat

In 2022, as part of their quarterly service project, the Youth Group began hosting an annual community Trunk or Treat.

The youth request candy donations from the parish and ask other parishioners to volunteer and decorate their trunks in order to provide plenty of "trunk or treating" options to the local kids.

A prize for the best decorated trunk is held each year to encourage the congregation to get creative and go all out for this fun community event.

In recent years, we've tied this to a charitable outreach partnering with the local animal shelter. What was once a simple blessing of the animals has evolved to a fun, family-friendly event. There are yard games, pumpkin painting, popcorn and live music to entertain the community. Both monetary and item donations are collected for the animal shelter. Each pet receives a blessing and a St. Francis medallion for their collar. Over the years, all types of animals have been blessed; dogs, cats, snakes, and even horses!

Worship Services

We believe that worship changes lives. We come together in the presence of God to sing, praise, and give thanks. The Holy Eucharist is celebrated every Sunday at 9am, and every Wednesday at 6pm at St. Luke's. The Sunday service is accompanied by traditional hymns played on the organ with music led by our choir. Our youth and other members of the church serve as acolytes, ushers and lectors each week. Often we send Lay Eucharistic Ministers to visit our sick and homebound with communion following the service. Our Sunday service is streamed on Facebook each week where virtual attendees can respond and interact with the service. After the service each Sunday, our congregational volunteers provide coffee and refreshments in the Parish Hall. There are 3 Sunday school groups for children (preschool, elementary, and Jr. High/High School) and an adult Sunday school class led by church members.

Another weekly service offering is the Healing Eucharist, held every Wednesday at 6pm in the church. We also have an active E.F.M class.


Our future outlook






2024 Budgeted Income

Our demographics



According to our latest parish survey, more than 55% of our congregation have been members for more than 15 years. We are a welcoming church with 80% responding that it is easy for new members to become involved in the life of the church. In addition, 43% of respondents stated they are involved in three or more ministries offered by the church, such as ushering, teaching Sunday school, volunteering at Matthew 25, etc. As the data shows, we are a very passionate and involved congregation who are committed to the success and vitality of St. Luke's and our surrounding community.
